In Term 1, IEF classes have been completing work developing their money skills, budgeting and Financial Literacy. Part of IEF 5's travel training, students attended an excursion to the **Reserve Bank in Martin Place**.

Myah: The best part was going to the bank. We walked, caught the Metro Train as well as a regular train. My favourite part was looking at the money on display at the Reserve Bank.
